The public health and economic crises caused by COVID-19 require government responses. In many parts of the world, however, governments have used the pandemic response to close civic spaces and violate human rights, not to ensure health and safety or support economic recovery. Some governments have made emergency declarations, while others have tightened their grip on the press, and many communities wonder if such restrictions will remain in place indefinitely.

The Senate Human Rights Caucus will host a discussion on the effects of COVID-19 on human rights and how authorities could respond to the pandemic while protecting and promoting fundamental rights and freedoms.
